



Year in Review





As ARTitorium approached its one year anniversary, we introduced a new set of promotional characters. IFAC also combined forces with Bank of Idaho, Museum of Idaho, and Idaho Falls Youth Arts Center to have a float in the 4TH OF JULY PARADE.

August kicked off with the annual ROARING YOUTH JAM. Our theme Sharky's ARTventure tied into the Museum of Idaho's exhibit Real Pirates and saw amazing participation with the community. In addition to the annual teen BATTLE OF THE BANDS, RYAN SHUPE AND THE RUBBERBAND played two amazing shows along the river, with over 600 people attending the evening performance.

The Hall Gallery opening for the SAMANTHA GRESHAM EXHIBITION saw one of the largest turn-outs for a solo exhibition we've ever seen. The 17-year-old artist, a student at Idaho Falls High School, sold 75% of her displayed works on opening night.

September officially marked the 25th Anniversary of the Idaho Falls Arts Council. We celebrated with two sold out special engagements with singer DAVID ARCHULETA, on his first shows back on the road. We kept tradition going by opening a crowd-favorite annual exhibition by the IDAHO WATERCOLOR SOCIETY.



October began with matinees of the Living Voices show LA CAUSA for middle school students at special request from the school district. We then kicked off our season in earnest with THE ANDY HACKBARTH BAND, who charmed the audience with original songs and unique covers. He was followed by comedian DAVE COULIER, who had Full House fans rolling in the aisles.

October also saw the first show in the Broadway at the Civic series. RIVERDANCE held three shows at the Civic Auditorium. In the Hall Gallery, WONDERFUL WAC held its 2nd annual exhibition, displaying the works of our artists in residence. ARTitorium made an appearance at BOO AT THE ZOO again this year, handing out candy and flyers to thousands of families from around the community.



November opened with Aquila Theatre's THE ADVENTURES OF SHERLOCK HOLMES, which brought the legendary detective and his loyal Watson to the stage. That same night we held an opening for DANIEL BORUP'S sculpture exhibition in the Carr Gallery. Next, the incredibly talented CHEYENNE JACKSON performed with the Teton Chamber Orchestra, singing songs from Elton John to Elvis to Broadway. This month also kicked off the holiday season with a huge turnout for MANNHEIM STEAMROLLER CHRISTMAS at the Civic Auditorium.





December was ARTitorium's month to shine. With Christmas movies one week and Harry Potter movies the next, CHRISTMAS BREAK AT ARTITORIUM saw over 1,100 patrons in two weeks. Meanwhile, the Willard Arts Center was busy every weekend, and then some, with parties and theater rentals.

January was the busiest month for IFAC. We started early with THE HIT MEN: FORMER STARS OF FRANKIE VALLI & THE FOUR SEASONS, and their nostalgic hits like "Oh What a Night". We kept the memories going with FLASHDANCE - THE MUSICAL. In the Carr Gallery, the GALLERY 12 EXHIBITION opened, displaying works by twelve well-known local and regional artists.

January is also home to one of our annual fundraisers - COLONIAL UNCORKED, which saw several wine distributers and caterers joining together to create an incredible meal. Next we took Living Voices productions to three schools before an evening performance of HEAR MY VOICE in the Carr Gallery with actress Rachel McClinton and Jim Francis leading a discussion. The month ended with big laughs with KATHLEEN MADIGAN taking the Colonial Theater stage.

February began with the STOMP, the third Broadway at the Civic show. It was followed by CIRQUE ALFONSE'S TIMBER, a lumberjack themed cirque show, in the Colonial Theater.

Next we had special school and family matinees of THE LIGHTNING THIEF and finished a month of family fun with Rhythmic Circus' FEET DON'T FAIL ME NOW. Rhythmic Circus also hosted a TAP DANCE MASTERCLASS that pulled in dancers of all levels and ages.



March kicked off with the LIGHTING THE WAY TO LITERACY auction in the Carr Gallery which benefits local literacy programs. March also saw the return of the indie folk band THE HUNTS.

The 8TH ANNUAL NATIONAL JURIED EXHIBITION opened, displaying works from the largest pool of submissions we have ever received. The next night, PORTLAND CELLO PROJECT, took the stage for a mixture of classical music and reimagined pop tunes.

The month ended with the second Living Voices production of the season. ISLAND OF HOPE performed at two elementary schools before The NEW AMERICAN night performance in the Carr Gallery.

ARTITORIUM'S SPRING BREAK finished out March and began April with over 1,400 patrons in the two weeks of discounts and activities.

At the Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors, board members Kevin King, Liza Leonard, Roger Plothow, Ann Marie Peters, and Coleen Neimann were voted in. Linda Hughes was voted in later in the summer.

April started by heading back in time to dance with Tony in SATURDAY NIGHT FEVER. The next week BLUE MAN GROUP thrilled a nearly sold out audience at the Civic Auditorium as the last of this year's Broadway at the Civic series.

Also in April, the Idaho Falls City Council voted for the Idaho Falls Arts Council to take over day-to-day administrative dealings for the Civic Auditorium. We wrapped up the month with our second major fundraiser WINE FEST AND MICROBREWS.

May wrapped up our season with LIVE AT 25 a variety show that honored IFAC's 25th Anniversary and harkened back to Getting Our Act Together, the first show in the newly remodeled theater.




